ABOUT THE MUSIC

This morning's piano prelude, *Autumn*, is by Pam Gervais. She has a degree in music composition from Southwest State University, where she and her family live, own, and manage a farm, in addition to her musical work. *Waltz in a minor*, heard during this morning's offering, is by the loved Polish composer Frédéric Chopin [1810-1849] of the nineteenth century Romantic period. His piano music has a distinctive flavor that is often evocative of some melancholy, which he dealt with throughout his relatively short, but at times dramatic life. The postlude, *Recessional in G*, is a delightful piece that shows shades of Debussy's impressionism in harmony and style. Colin Mawby [b. 1936] served for many years as Master of Music for the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Most Precious Blood, the mother church of the Catholic denomination in England and Wales. He is a prolific composer, choral conductor, organist, and pianist.

Hymn No. 348, "Guide My Feet," is a traditional African-American spiritual found in the collection of Willis Laurence James [1900-1966], a concert violinist, teacher and folklorist who taught for most of his career at Spellman College in Atlanta, Georgia.

I Am Willing is a moving anthem of hope and courage and redemption amidst the challenges of a broken world. It is written by singer, songwriter, and activist Holly Near, whose career and work have both mirrored and inspired four decades of social change. Among her many works and honors, Near delivered the prestigious Ware lecture at the UUA General Assembly in 2005. Today's choral arrangement is by Steve Milloy. How Long? by Pepper Choplin, is a distinctive a cappella, spiritual-like original, which beautifully conveys a powerful yearning for peace. Emotional and uplifting, it also encourages all to "press on." Choplin incorporates varied styles—such as folk, Gospel, classical, and jazz—in his music. His published work includes over 250 anthems for church and school choir, with 16 church cantatas and a book of piano arrangements. Over 100 groups have commissioned him to write original works for them.

Hymn No. 1017, "Building a New Way," was written by Martha Sandefer, a musician who has performed many genres of music in a wide variety of settings for more than 30 years. She has recorded, sung, and played with Trapezoid, the folk and contemporary acoustic ensemble, and the Work 'o the Weavers quartet. The song was arranged for *Singing the Journey* by UU Composer Jim Scott.
